s we awaken each day to news of warfare and violence around our globe and to turmoil in the United States relating to climate disasters and our impending elections, we may find ourselves filled with unease and searching for the way forward. We are reminded by the late Bishop Ken Untener that "it helps, now and then, to step back and take a long view." It helps to live from a stance of transforming grace.



that transforming grace? **Loving** refuses grudges and doesn't ask

for a return. One who loves has a very big God, indeed. Isn't that transforming grace?

Sharing is done by one who is convinced there is enough for all. There is no need to hoard or hold out. One who shares knows a provident God. Isn't that transforming grace?

Recently I helped prepare a memorial service for my cousin Karen, who died of Alzheimer's disease at the age of 80. In pondering Karen's life and the impact she had, I was drawn to a contemporary reading of Proverbs 31 from the CSJ Ministry of the Arts website.

[1] The book of Proverbs dates back nearly 3,000 years -- so it offers the long view. Karen personified the key words of this translation: valiant, joyful, strong, patient, loving and sharing. In these challenging times, we need women -- and all people -- to live these qualities.

Valiant connotes determination and courage. One who is valiant knows her heart and stands her ground, and recognizes that others have strongly held convictions, too. Isn't that transforming grace?

Joyful goes beyond happy. It is a way of being that centers one and allows one to love in spite of loss. Isn't that transforming grace?

Strong can refer to both physical and emotional resourcefulness. One who is strong doesn't need to dominate; she has what she needs to deal with life as it comes. Isn't that transforming grace?

Patient means steadfast, staying the course despite great challenge. One who is patient can stay at the table

I am drawn to a beautiful comment from the 2024 LCWR assembly evaluations by one of our members. (I cannot give credit for this beautiful reflection because evaluations are submitted anonymously)

"I believe we are called to more than legacy, completion and/or fulfillment. We are called to deep transformation -- personally and communally (separate from our sense of separateness) to bring about God's kingdom. Anne Hillman says in her book, *Awakening the Energies of Love - Discovering Fire for the Second Time* (p. 57), 'If we hope to bless our children's and grandchildren's future lives, we need to do the hard work of challenging our own thinking -- and hold one another gently and with mercy as we each untangle the limiting beliefs that hold us and our culture captive.' Exploring ways for leadership to engage in this work in a very intentional way with our members, associates, etc. feels like a topic that would complement the work of this assembly."

Our journey of transforming grace is the way forward.

Resource for Communal Discernment

Ongoing discernment of capacity for leadership is essential in this time of rapid change. To assist leaders with the processes of change and transition, Mary Jo Nelson, OLVM is developing a communal discernment resource based on her leadership experience in her own congregation and learnings gleaned from her service as a facilitator. The guide is available on the LCWR website with other Discerning the Emerging Future resources.

Entitled "LCWR Discernment Guide for Selecting Future Leadership," the user-friendly resource will eventually have four segments:

Part 1: Beginning the conversation on leadership -- How do you know when you can no longer elect a leadership team?

Part 2: Making a choice -- The congregation is called to discern two crucial elements moving forward: What choices do you have when you need an appointed leader? What choice will your congregation make and why?

Part 3: Tending the future relationships -- How do you identify persons who can accompany you and provide leadership when you can no longer elect your own leadership?

Part 4: Transitioning to an appointed leader -- How will you orient, on-board, and transition leadership to an appointed leader?

Mary Jo will explain the discernment guide for selecting future leadership and answer questions during a Zoom conversation on **October 31**, 1:00-2:30 PM ET. Participants in the Zoom session are asked to access a copy of the guide prior to the online conversation. Conversations for Leaders of International Congregations

The first of a series of online conversations for leaders of international congregations will take place November 7, 1:00-2:30 PM ET. This session, **International and Intercultural Leadership**, will feature Mary Ann Buckley, SHCJ and Pat McDermott, RSM who will offer insights as a springboard for breakout and large group leader-to-leader conversations.

Mary Ann, the American province leader of the Society of the Holy Child Jesus, will share stories of her international community's response to the Society's recent chapter call to reorganize for mission today and tomorrow in a rapidly changing world as they live their demographic shift from global north to south.

Pat, former president of the Sisters of Mercy of the Americas, will reflect on how she has been deeply gifted through her engagements with other Mercy leaders throughout the world. Pat will speak to what she has learned from a vibrantly diverse experience of "seeing the whole" from various perspectives, while always honoring relationships. LCWR Launches New Initiative for All Women Religious: Living into Our Emerging Future

iving into Our Emerging Future is an initiative launched by LCWR in response to the requests from leaders for solid content and processes on living religious life in this time of dramatic change that could be used with the members of their institutes. This new initiative, which will run through February 2026, provides materials on religious life as it is being lived in this transitional time as well as processes for individual reflection and conversation. It also provides opportunities for the members of congregations to participate in Zoom sessions with women religious in other institutes so that sisters can connect across institutes for conversations together on substantive topics.

Leaders are encouraged to promote this opportunity in their own institutes. The initiative consists of six modules offered over 18 months.

For each module, LCWR will host three Zoom sessions for any woman religious who would like to participate in conversations about the module. Registration links for the first two modules can be found in the calendar on page 6.

In this edition, authors explore what helps one to live with the unknown. How might a person be sustained over the long haul? How does one find meaning and purpose – when so much seems to be changing with rapidity in the world and in the lives of religious communities? How might leaders best encourage and inspire their members to welcome the mystery of these times and be open to its potential?

Writers explore a number of topics including: how to find meaning when living with the unknown, practices and rituals for staying grounded in uncertain times, and the need for one another as all live through change. Also included are interviews with author and public theologian **Brian D. McLaren** and sociologist **Allison Pugh** who provide insights about how to thrive in these times and continue to contribute to the larger world by facing honestly the seismic shifts that appear to be ahead.

LCWR and CWR Initiate an Organizational Alliance

t its annual conference held from October 8-11 outside of Chicago, the Communicators for Women Religious (CWR) voted to begin a new alliance with LCWR.

CWR had recognized that as it found itself at a financial crossroads it needed to change its organizational model. In the new model, LCWR will provide a paid part-time network coordinator to provide administrative support to CWR. This will allow for the elimination of paid membership and fees for resources. Memberships and opportunities for professional development via CWR's resources will be open to anyone interested. The new model will be dependent upon the work of volunteer committees of CWR members.

CWR voted to dissolve its nonprofit organizational structure and move the administrative structure into LCWR beginning January 1, 2025.

In a letter sent earlier this year to the CWR board, LCWR executive director Carol Zinn, SSJ noted, "Your work to provide professional education and support to those who work to communicate and advance the mission of women religious has been commendable. It has been a delight to see how the organization has responded to the changing realities of institutes of

women religious for these last 30 years and has been an invaluable support.

"We recognize that the dissolution of the organization's current status and transition into a different type of entity is significant. Due to your hard work and careful strategic planning, we believe that the new connection between our organizations will serve the mission of women religious well. We applaud the efforts you have made to assure that communicators will be able to continue this service competently and professionally.

"Our hope is that the new arrangement will serve as a strong support to all who carry on the role of communications for their religious institute. Your ministry is critical to the well-being of religious life."

The new relationship was celebrated through a ritual that included the mingling of waters from both organizations that was used to water a new tree, symbolizing the building of a fresh pathway, rooted in the wisdom of the past and infused with the promise of a bright future.

The International Union of Superiors General (UISG) is offering an online formation program for new religious life leadership teams, "Heart and Soul of Leadership."

The four-module program focuses on:

- Responding to the Call (December 3-5, 2024)

- Canon Law (March 24-26, 2025)
- Being Your Best Self (June 11-13, 2025)

The online sessions are held over the course of three consecutive days from 2:00 to 4:15 PM (Rome time) in English with live translation into Italian, French, and Spanish. Other languages may be available on request.
