A Transforming Journey

he feast of the Incarnation is quickly followed by a plentitude of liturgical celebrations during Ordinary Time. God's overflowing love became human with us in the person of Christ. Christ took on every aspect of our ordinary lives beginning with his birth in a humble environment, his journey as an immigrant, his baptism calling him into a ministry of beatitude, and the fulfillment of his divine mission on the cross. The life of Jesus calls us likewise into that same transforming journey.



compose realities in which we are called to be faithful.

These concepts move us to desire and engage in dialogue. Contemplation or discernment about faithfulness to the Gospel and to the formation of conscience move us to options and a plan of action in responding to situations of injustice. An evaluative measure of the process will provide evidence of how it has strengthened us in the formative elements of reverencing the other, fidelity to the Gospel, and the common good.

In my last column I reflected that "creative fidelity" is our commitment to the journey and that our accountability will be witnessed in ways that honor the unpredictability of life's mysteries. We are constantly aware that relationships within our church and world serve as a never-ending awakening to the transformation to which the Gospel calls us. Biblical history gives us countless examples of the urgency of joining God in the ongoing work of acknowledging the emergence of the Kingdom as it exists today. It encourages its further coming which will hold the powers and principalities of our contemporary world to God's vision of peace and justice.

My own Franciscan tradition offers insights for understanding creative fidelity. Duns Scotus speaks of justice and prudence as a way to mediate relationships. He helps us understand the relationship between creativity and fidelity. The virtue of prudence, as moral excellence, is a type of moral artistic beauty. It functions in an artistic manner by identifying what elements ought to be present, by judging actions according to a whole of beauty or completeness, and then adjusting human response in light of specific conditions present in a given reality. Fidelity is insufficient. It has to be coupled with creativity for the reign of God to be realized.

The notion of prudence appears four times in Clare of Assisi's writing. In her Second Letter to Agnes she speaks of traveling the path of prudent happiness, inferring the necessity of learning how to compose and re-

God will not be silent as world and ecclesial tensions are negotiated. Rather than a static or servile obedience, creative fidelity can evidence itself by resisting caricatures and demonizing violence, by unyielding integrity and by wrestling with our own transformation. In this way the diversity of a religious institute's gifts to the

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mission will assume its proper role; it will be a public communal testimony to the responsibilities of all Christians to be the Word among complex social situations which cry for the beatitude life of God's reign.

Creating this beatitude life is inscribed on the heart of fidelity to be in communion with the church and to follow Christ who is always on the way with us. God's return to the world is an ongoing process: it reflects a nonviolent advent of peace and hope whenever injustice does not have its way.

Spiritual Directors International Expresses Gratitude to Women Religious

CWR president Mary Hughes, OP recently received a letter from the coordinating council of Spiritual Directors International thanking women religious for their significant role in the practice of spiritual direction.

The letter, written by the council chair Terrence J. Moran, CSSR, states, "We especially want to express our support and solidarity during this time of the Apostolic Visitation of communities of apostolic religious women in the United States as well as the doctrinal assessment of the LCWR."

He continues, "A Jewish woman who was a former member of the Coordinating Council once said, 'I am amazed and very grateful at how sisters have been a vessel for holding the gift of spiritual direction for the world.' At a time when the exhibit *Women & Spirit* has focused attention on the extraordinary impact the educational and social ministries of women religious have had, we would like to highlight the less easily measurable but equally significant contribution of women religious to companioning others in the ways of the Spirit. As spiritual directors, trainers, and supervisors of fledgling spiritual directors, as researchers and writers in the discipline, as poets and artists of the Spirit — the contribution of women religious has been outstanding in diversity and depth...."

He added, "In recent years Spiritual Directors International has reflected frequently on how the practice of spiritual direction and contemplative practice can contribute to justice, peace, and the integrity of creation. We note with gratitude the insistence of the Leadership Conference of Women Religious that spiritual practice must express itself in working toward the flourishing of life for Earth and all its inhabitants."

Work on Behalf of Immigrants Continues in Negative Climate

lthough the DREAM Act was defeated in the lame-duck Congress, and efforts will be even more challenging in the 112th Congress, Justice for Immigrants and the Interfaith Immigration Coalition will continue to promote immigration reform. Some immigration groups are focusing on voter registration of "new Americans" for 2012. Given the new chairs of the House Judiciary Committee and Homeland Security, a push for more worksite raids is anticipated, and perhaps picking up the "dreamers" who came out of the shadows on behalf of the DREAM Act. Initial work will be to mitigate anticipated negative legislation. Members of JFI will begin Capitol Hill lobby visits to Catholic freshmen lawmakers in the House, 33 or 34 out of 96 freshmen. Work in the states will be important, so local visits will be encouraged during the next recess. JFI will also continue education efforts in parishes and training of diocesan communication directors. Maryknoll Sisters Celebrate 100 Years and Honor Bill Ford

n January 6, the date of the founding of the Maryknoll Sisters, an event was held at the Rayburn House Office building in DC to celebrate the anniversary, remember the 1980 deaths of the North American churchwomen in El Salvador, and honor Bill Ford, brother of Ita Ford who died last year. It was Bill, a lawyer, who persisted for many years to bring the murderers to justice and to keep alive the memory of the women.

Several US Representatives attended and spoke, including Jim McGovern, Marcy Kaptur and Nita Lowey, as well as former Senator Chris Dodd. Members of the Ford family were present as well as Maryknoll community members and many friends and supporters. Bill Ford's wife, Mary Ann, spoke with moving eloquence about how the murder of Ita transformed their family. Marie Lucey, OSF, associate director for social mission, represented LCWR at the celebration.


